

A STUDY OF COLOSSIANS (PART 1)

When Paul was writing to the believers in Rome he declared, "I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes..." (Romans 1:16) He was convinced that the message he preached was transformational. His message was centred around Jesus Christ, the incarnate God and it had been birthed out of his own personal encounter and ongoing relationship with Him. Paul had never visited Colosse, so he writes a letter and shares his gospel, revealing Christ to them and teaching them how to live as His disciples. This is a letter for us all.

Colossians 1:1-2

¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother,

² To the saints and faithful brothers in Christ at Colossae:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

Saints -Strongs 40- most holy thing, sacred, consecrated

Colossians 1:3-8

³ We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, ⁴ since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. Of this you have heard before in the word of the truth, the gospel, ⁶ which has come to you, as indeed in the whole world it is bearing fruit and increasing - as it also does among you, since the day you heard it and understood the grace of God in truth, ⁷ just as you learned it from Epaphras our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf ⁸ and has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

When we receive a letter we want to know who it is from and to whom it is addressed.

Colossians 1:9-12

⁹ And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, ¹⁰ so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him: bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God; ¹¹ being strengthened with all power, according to his glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy; ¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light.

Knowledge -Strong's 1922- precise / correct knowledge Understanding -Strong's 4907- running / flowing together Endurance -Strong's 5281- steadfastness, constancy Patience -Strong's 3115- longsuffering, slow to avenge wrongs

Colossians 1:13-14

¹³ He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

Domain -1849- authority , jurisdiction, power of rule Kingdom -932- royal power, territory subject to rule of king

John 10:10-11

¹⁰ The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. ¹¹ I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.

It is believed that the church in Colosse was being influenced by some false teachers who were saying that Jesus was not enough and that secret knowledge and extra practices were needed to reach God. Despite this being the smallest church Paul ever wrote to, his letter contains his fullest teachings on who Jesus is. Lets read on to find out what he says.

Paul's prayers in the NT letters provide us with wonderful templates to use as we pray for others. Let's discover what Paul asks God to do in the life of these Colossian believers.

Colossians 1:15-20

¹⁵ He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. ¹⁶ For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities- all things were created through him and for him. ¹⁷ And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸ And he is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything he might be preeminent. 19 For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ²⁰ and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross.

Colossians 1:21-23

²¹ And you, who once were alienated and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, ²² he has now reconciled in his body of flesh by his death, in order to present you holy and blameless and above reproach before him, ²³ if indeed you continue in the faith, stable and steadfast, not shifting from the hope of the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed in all creation under heaven, and of which I, Paul, became a minister.
