

The book of Numbers contains within it two accounts of Moses taking a census of the people. The first is at the start of their journey to the Promise Land (Numbers ch1), when God's promises filled their vision and directed their steps, The second is taken 40 years later, (Numbers ch26). The people of Israel are still in the wilderness and their inheritance is still ahead. But something has changed. Out of over 600,000 men who started this journey only 2 will claim the prize. The rest were laid low in the wilderness.(see 1 Cor 10:5) How can we as Christians in the 21st century learn from their story and be those who run the race well? What does resilience in our walk with God look like and how can we persevere? Peter knew that his life was soon to be over when he wrote his second letter and he has much to teach us that will help us on our journey. He was writing to believers who were about to suffer severe persecution.

2 Peter 1:5-7

⁵ For this very reason, make every effort to supplement your faith with virtue, and virtue with knowledge, ⁶ and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with steadfastness, and steadfastness with godliness, ⁷ and godliness with brotherly affection, and brotherly affection with love.

Notice that Peter tells us that we make every effort to supplement our faith, not to replace it. God's work in us is foundational.

VIRTUE —moral goodness, modesty, purity KNOWLEDGE—intelligence , understanding SELF CONTROL—one who can master his desires STEADFASTNESS—constancy, endurance GODLINESS— reverence, respect BROTHERLY AFFECTION—love of other believers LOVE—agape love reflects the love of God for us.

2 Peter 1:8-11

⁸ For if these qualities are yours and are increasing, they keep you from being ineffective or unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹ For whoever lacks these qualities is so near-sighted that he is blind, having forgotten that he was cleansed from his former sins. ¹⁰ Therefore, brothers, be all the more diligent to confirm your calling and election, for if you practice these qualities you will never fall. ¹¹ For in this way there will be richly provided for you an entrance into the eternal king-dom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Peter has shared all that God has generously given to us to equip us for life and godliness. Now he deals with the believers responsibility.

Hebrews 12:1-3

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, ² looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

³ Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted.

¹⁴ Therefore, beloved, since you are waiting for these, be diligent to be found by him without spot or blemish, and at peace.

¹⁷ You therefore, beloved, knowing this beforehand, take care that you are not carried away with the error of lawless people and lose your own stability. ¹⁸ But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity. Amen.

How can you deepen your knowledge of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ?

What will it mean for you to "make every effort"?

Ask God to help you to live out your life for Him, resting in His strength and power as you deepen your knowledge of Him, and diligently seeking to develop the qualities that will make your life fruitful and effective in your knowledge of God. Peter is not the only Bible author to teach us how to persevere. The writer of the book of Hebrews teaches us the same lessons with a different focus.

Observe - What does the text say?


Understand - What does the text mean?
